Message

The whole beauty of giving lies in that you have to surrender, let go, and give knowing that you are doing it in order to better someone else's life; and that itself could be the ultimate reward for giving. Imam Hussain (A.S) sacrificed his life, his family, his position all in the spirit of giving us hope and truth for a better life. He surrendered to the will of Allah and gave open-heartedly; putting his full trust in Allah, knowing that Allah would take care of the rest.

The people who died in Karachi on Ashura this year also gave their lives for the glory of Imam, as did the people who were injured and were left behind to deal with the aftermath of what happened. For the sake of their faith they gave their spirit wholeheartedly to voice the call of the Imam and to tell the world of what happened in Karbala 1400 years ago; and although there is a pall of sadness, but, for their act of "Giving" they will be remembered forever.

When you give you get back, but it is only through non-attachment to outcome that we can fully learn to receive the benefit of what we give.

Be flexible: Remember that there will always be interruptions and distraction. Allow time for them as well.



FAST Seminar at FEN



Profession in Spotlight Journalism Rizwana Naqvi

Ms.Rizwana Naqvi works for the Dawn Groups of Newspapers. She joined Dawn in 1996, and became Editor Incharge of "Young World" in 2000. Currently she is taking care of 'Review' – the social and women oriented pages of Dawn's weekend magazine 'Images'.

- Q1. What motivated you to pursue a career in Journalism and especially about children's literature in English?
- A1. A deep interest in reading and writing and the aim to highlight various problems in our society brought me to this field.

As Editor In charge of Young World I tried to create awareness among the children of our country regarding the society they live in and the world at large, their rights and responsibilities, the role they are expected to play in the future. At the same time character building has been an important aspect of the magazine with appropriate articles published every now and then.

- Q2. What skills should students possess to be successful professionals in Journalism?
- A2. You have to have a command over the language in which you want to write/report. At the same time you should develop interest in reading whatever material that is available to you so that you have background knowledge of what is happening in the world. Since no one can read on every subject you can choose a few subjects for yourself like politics, current affairs, science and technology, social issues, entertainment.
- Q3. What are some of the challenges professionals especially women face in this career?
- A3. Women in our society face a lot of problems when they go out in the work field. They are generally considered incapable of handling difficult tasks and handling pressures, or going on outdoor assignments. The same is true for journalism. Women are often discouraged from active reporting.

One often has to work odd hours and late nights in this field; women find it difficult to stay late at work, especially in our society.

But let's not lose hope; things are improving and more and more women are entering this field.

Q4. What is the future of Journalism in Pakistan and abroad?

- A4. We cannot say that journalism does not have a future, though print media is facing threat from electronic media and news websites. Most young people now prefer to go for electronic media as it has more value both in terms of glamour and finances; but at the same time it is very time demanding.
 - While e-media is gaining popularity, newspapers have their own importance as people can read detailed analysis and reports at their leisure wherever they want.
- Q5. What types of career options are available in Journalism and news channels?
- A5. Journalism is not just about reporting, editing and writing; with the evolution of e-media the field has expanded and now one can choose from reporter, newscaster, news producer, news editor, documentary producer, script writer, anchor person for talk shows, showbiz programme host, etc.
- Q6. What are the minimum qualifications to become a professional in Journalism and which universities offer a degree in Journalism?
- A6. Though one can join a newspaper or a channel after obtaining a bachelor's degree as well, it is better to go for a master's degree. The best option is to study Mass Communication.

As far as I am aware all major universities in Pakistan offer a degree in Journalism.

Besides that, as said earlier, Master's degree in English Literature, International Relations and Political science can also help you get into journalism. The basic thing is command over language and in depth knowledge.

- Q7. What will be your message for students of Fatimiyah Education Network (FEN)?
- A7. Work hard, study well and broaden your horizon, gain knowledge about the world you live in; at the same time maintain a positive attitude towards life.

Don't be disheartened, don't listen to people talking about our country in negative terms and DON'T fall into the trap of sectarian or ethnic organisations.

Take care of yourselves, keep your eyes open and listen to your parents. If they do not want you to go out alone or at odd hours, obey them.
